

THEODORE C. LUTZ '67 Distinguished Achievement

Theodore Lutz '67 has distinguished himself in a variety of administrative and financial positions.

Following graduation from Carleton with a major in government, Lutz entered the Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs at Syracuse University, where he earned an M.P.A. in 1968. He became a budget examiner for the U.S. Office of Management and Budget and later Deputy Under Secretary for Budget and Program Review in the U.S. Department of Transportation. In 1976 he became general manager of the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority, where he oversaw the construction and expansion of its network. Another stint at the Department of Transportation (1979-81) was followed by a move in 1981 to *The Washington Post* to become Vice President/Controller. He is now its Vice President and Business Manager.

In the course of his professional activities he has earned numerous awards and honors including the Secretary's Outstanding Achievement Award of the Transportation Department in 1975, the



Washingtonian of the Year Award from *Washingtonian Magazine* in 1978, and the Rail Man of the Year Award from *Modern Railroads/Rail Transit Magazine* in 1979.

He and his wife Willa Jean Boyd live in Falls Church, Virginia. They have two children. He has been a member of numerous boards and civic commissions, in addition to devoting time to his family, church, and hobbies, which include softball. In 1985 he attended a Philadelphia Phillies "Dream Week" - a camp for baseball enthusiasts.
